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Making the contract when the opening lead is from an unsupported ace.

S 2C (23 hcp, 3 aces worth another point, good 5 card spade suit worth another point $=25$. Close between opening 2C and 3 NT \{25-27 points). I chose 2 C as I might be able to make an extra trick in a major suit contract. At IMPS (team games), I would open this hand 3 NT, as it might be easier to make 9 tricks than 10 and I want to protect my King of clubs from a potential opening club lead through it. The extra trick in IMPS is not overly important.)

N 2D (waiting)

N 3C (no ace or king, a weak hand)
S 3H (Looking for a potential heart fit)
N 4 S (3 spades and maybe a ruffing trick)

Passed out.

West leads the Ace of clubs. A poor lead for the defense. This makes my King of clubs good and gives me a chance to make my contract.


The 9 of diamonds is led to my ace.


I can afford to play one round of spades. So, I cash my A of spades. Then play the AK of hearts and ruff a heart,


When the 10 of hearts comes down, my 9 is now good. I still have to lose a diamond and a spade. But then my hand is good making 4 S .
